# **LAGs Regulation Tracker**

---

## **Latest Developments**

- *EU / Singapore: Changi Airport has become the first third country airport to be recognised as meeting the necessary security standards. From 03 January 2008, passengers arriving in the EU and transferring to another flight will be allowed to carry their duty free LAGs with them through security screening checkpoints.*
- *Oman: The Civil Aviation Authority of the Sultanate of Oman has introduced new restrictions on the carriage of LAGs in carry on baggage as from 01 January 2008. Transfer passengers will not be permitted to carry duty free LAGs through transfer screening points until they have concluded agreements with other states.*
- *Kuwait: New security measures in line with ICAO guidelines were introduced at Kuwait International Airport on 01 January 2008. Duty Free LAGs will be allowed through transfer screening points if they are sealed in an “appropriate” security tamper-evident bag, with the name of the airport / airline and till receipt prominently displayed.*
